3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- A Puppet show with an important message – "Why and how youngsters should show their respect and concern to elders" was organised in the neighbourhood community hall for the public.
- Awareness camps on dental trouble and care and a talk on Girl child trafficking were organised at Wesley school.

- An awareness talk on breast cancer was conducted in the college in collaboration with Basawa Tarakram Indo American cancer hospital.
- A dental camp was organised in the campus for the college students.
- Students volunteered in the 61st Vanya Prani celebrations organized by Telangana Forest department, to promote wild life conservation.
- Around 40 students and staff members were involved in *Swachh Bharat* mission and participation in *Swachh Bharat* awareness walk.
- The College has 2 registered National Social Service units. The volunteers participated in regular activities like Plantation, *Swachh Bharat*, International Yoga Day Celebrations, Rally on AIDS day, People Climate March, Candle making, Pulse Polio, Campaign against social evils and Health Awareness Programmes.
- Students participated in 2K run on Suicide prevention and Global Awareness walk on Climate Change.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

- The Management and the Heads of the Departments met periodically to discuss the academic progress of the students.
- The various committee meetings were held to plan various student centric activities.
- The suggestions and feedback from the committees helped the college in taking policy decisions and putting in place a suitable system to assure and enhance the performance of the students.
- Class- in charge lecturers who act as mentors offered academic counselling to students, recommended them for remedial coaching if necessary, and also met the parents of their mentees to discuss about their progress.

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

VISION: To empower women through holistic education, to function effectively as competent, socially committed and compassionate individuals.

MISSION: The mission of the College is to achieve high academic and ethical standards with scientific aptitude and social consciousness through value-based quality education.

6.2 Does the Institution have a management Information System:

YES

- The College ensures a system of participative management, whereby information flow and decision making processes are systematised and channelled through all key constituents of the College.
- The suggestions given by the Governing Body, the Management Committee and the Finance Committee are implemented by the administrative office, under the leadership and guidance of the Principal.
- The Heads of departments ensure the smooth functioning of the departmental activities in collaboration with other departments.
- For the smooth and effective functioning of the College, interactions with stakeholders comprising of Faculty, Parents, Alumnae and the Students, are regularly organised. Relevant feedback received from stake-holders is considered for continuous review and revision catering to the changing needs of Higher Education.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the syllabus prescribed by the Osmania University. The institution however tries to involve in the curriculum development process.

- Heads of Departments attend the University departmental meetings on a regular basis where discussions regarding curriculum development are held.
- The departments take feedback on curriculum from the Academic Experts, Students and Alumni, and communicate to the concerned Chairman, Board of Studies, OU, for improving the quality and updating the curriculum.
- In addition to the prescribed curriculum, several certificate and job oriented skill development programmes were offered to the students.
- SAP course was offered to B.Com final year students.
- To widen the knowledge of the students, Interdisciplinary programmes were designed and implemented for all the Second and Final year students.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning Criteria

- Orientation programmes for the faculty are conducted periodically to enhance their teaching skills
- At the beginning of the academic year teaching plans are prepared based on the curriculum and followed meticulously.
- ICT is used extensively for effective teaching and learning.
- Departments are encouraged to organize Student Enrichment Programmes like seminars, conferences, workshops and symposia.
- Faculty and students are inspired to attend relevant programmes in their respective fields in and out of the Institution.
- Faculty members are motivated to design contemporary, skill based Interdisciplinary and value-added courses.
- Library resources are increased every year to include recent editions, new books and journals to enrich the teaching and learning process.

- Teacher Evaluation through various methods like feedback by students, parents, peers and management promotes quality teaching and learning.
- Innovative Teaching Methodologies like film shows, projects, e-assignments, presentations, class seminars, models, group discussions, quiz, Virtual labs and field trips pave way for innovative learning.
- Conducive learning environment is provided in the campus
- Bridge courses are conducted by all departments to fill any knowledge gaps.
- Study material prepared by teachers (Soft copy of PPTs, Lecture Synopsis, Reading material) and question banks are made available to the students through the central library and the departmental libraries.
- Slow learners are identified and guided through remedial classes.
- Co-operation between advanced and slow learners is encouraged in learning.
- Advanced learners are offered extra-curricular assignments and leadership tasks.
- Testing and evaluation patterns are constantly reviewed to assess learning.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The College evaluates students through various Spot Assessment tests, Unit tests, Term-end and Pre-Final examinations.
- Continuous Comprehensive Examination (CCE) is practiced through Objective tests, Assignments, Case study reports, Group discussions apart from the above regular tests. Open book system, online assignments and examinations are also practiced
- Evaluated answer sheets are given to the students with instructions to improve their learning skills and subject knowledge.
- Parents are informed about the performance of their wards through Parent-Teacher meets. Progress reports are sent to them periodically.
- Theoretical knowledge is also assessed through practicals conducted in the laboratories.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The Management has constituted a Research Committee to promote scientific thinking among Faculty and Students and orient them towards research in the following ways :
- By encouraging the Faculty to enrol for M. Phil, Ph. D, SLET/ NET.
- By giving seed money for Research projects and necessary infrastructural facilities.
- By sponsoring participation and paper presentation by Faculty regularly in regional/ national/ international conferences / seminars / workshops.
- By acknowledging staff publication of research articles with honorarium.
- By approving proposals for Collaborative research with research institutes/ Universities.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Every year a budget is allocated for the upgradation of the library towards the purchase of latest editions of books, journals, magazines etc.
- Library Software like NLSIT from INFLIBNET, EBSCO-Business elite, J-Gate and NewGen Lib 3.04 are used.
- To cater to the needs of the under privileged students, a Book Bank is available.
- 13 sage Journals have been subscribed in both print and online formats.
- The college encourages an extensive use of ICT aided teaching & learning, library facilities, information system, sports and extracurricular activities.
- To keep pace with multidimensional growth of the college the physical infrastructure has been augmented in a phased manner.
- Wi-Fi facility is provided.
- Close circuit cameras are installed at prime locations.
- Laptops are provided to facilitate technology based teaching, research and maintaining data.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The Management reviews the need of the Institution in terms of Staff and Students and plans for recruitment and admission procedure at the end of each academic year.
- Orientation programs are organized for new recruits.
- In order to enhance the capacities of staff, FDPs are organized for them periodically.
- Recreation programs are also organized for all the staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff Recruitment

- At the end of each academic year, the Management reviews the teaching and non-teaching posts and recruits staff according to the vacancies through prescribed procedures.
- Applications from the eligible candidates are invited by advertising the vacancies in leading Regional and National newspapers.
- All the applications are screened and the short listed candidates are interviewed by the selection committee comprising of subject experts nominated by Osmania University, Principal and Head of the Department.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- The Institution adopts the following practices to strengthen the interaction and Linkages with the Industry:
- Industrial visits are organized to expose students in the use of modern equipment used in the industry.
- Collaborative student projects with the industry are taken up to help them understand the needs of the industry and give them hands-on training.
- The Institution has an MoU with ITC Ramky for Recycling of paper annually.
- The Institution has an MoU with ATM travel industry for training in travel and tourism.
- To strengthen the Placements of the students, the placement cell actively interacts with various reputed industries.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- All information relating to admission processes is made known to the public by way of a Help Desk that is set up during admissions.
- The use of ICT has facilitated the Admission process and has reduced the amount of paperwork. The ICT enabled process has facilitated the generation of student profile reports.
- An analysis of the profile reports helps in identifying students who need special assistance, such as those from regional language medium schools, students from rural backgrounds and first generation learners. Special training programmes are conducted for these students. This enhances their communication skills and boosts their confidence to blend in with the college community.

The student chapter has been constituted with president – Ms. Sravani (III MBC), Ravali (III MGC) as Vice President & Mounika (III MZC) as Secretary.
- More Close Circuit cameras were installed on the campus to ensure safety and security of the students and faculty members.

BEST PRACTICE 1

Title of the Practice:

“KNOWLEDGE AND SKILL ENHANCEMENT THROUGH ACADEMIC EXHIBITION - PIOUS COLONNADE”

Goal: To instill a pragmatic approach to learning in the students through working models that correlate with their theoretical knowledge and propagate the importance of academic excellence in higher education.

Context: Global competency has become a significant factor for sustainability in today's world. The students in higher education can be provided with a practical approach to theoretical learning with the help of a multidisciplinary academic exhibition based on working models. It can give a factual experience through live projects, foster value based learning through coordination and cooperation and develop high scientific thinking among the students.

With a view to encourage scientific thinking, the college organized an academic exhibition titled PIOUS - COLONNADE. It was a platform for the students to showcase their innovative ideas, skills and subject knowledge through working models. The exhibition also aimed to reinforce the relationship between the Institute, industry and community.

PRACTICE:

Planning

- The Principal and the Staff planned for the academic exhibition a year ahead and decided on the category of the exhibits. All departments came up with various innovative ideas which included live projects and models. The event name and brochure were discussed and two Staff members were given the charge of coordinating the event.
- The departments were asked to involve the students to the maximum and encourage coordination and cooperation.
- The financial aspect was discussed with support from the Management.
- The plan was conveyed to the Student Council and the Class Representatives by the respective departments, class in- charges and subject lecturers.
- Invitation to schools and colleges was taken up with student support, word of mouth and by sending e-mails. 60 colleges were informed about the exhibition to send their students.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- All departments and around 800 students were involved in this academic colonnade. The students were allotted class rooms and laboratories to accommodate the exhibits and the models. They were also asked to stay one hour after college timings to complete their models with guidance from faculty.
- The departments assigned volunteers to escort the visitors, guide them to the exhibits and take feedback.
- The Colonnade saw huge inflow of visitors from various schools, colleges and surrounding area, parents and relatives of the students.
- Feedback was collected from the visitors by the student volunteers and submitted to the departments based on the models.
- The students were awarded certificates as a token of appreciation for their enthusiastic participation.

Evidence of success:

- The academic Exhibition resulted in developing a positive rapport, good team spirit, time management skills among the students apart from strengthening the scientific aptitude.
- The stakeholders and the visitors appreciated the standards of institution in providing higher education.

Problems Encountered and resources required:

- More number of students enthusiastically volunteered for model making and some models required electricity for their functioning and hence providing enough space for all the exhibits was a constraint. Even labs were used for this purpose.
- Since the second term was crucial for academics, the regular classes could not be disturbed and hence students had to stay back beyond the college hours.
- The budget for making the models was very high and the management obliged to provide the entire financial support for the exhibition.

BEST PRACTICE 2

Title of the Practice:

“INSTITUTIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY”

Goal: To cultivate the value of compassion, care for human and environmental resources and work towards the Nation's well being by identifying the needs of the society and raising awareness about the alarming issues prevailing in the society. To motivate the students to act with responsibility towards a solution to the problems by devising a strategy and preserve human and environment resources.

Context: The institution aims to devise strategies to support the weak and the needy, and conserve natural resources in collaboration with the respective organizations. It identifies the prevailing needs of the society and raises awareness on the issues that demands attention. The increasing number of suicides by framers due to their financial losses in the present time has a great impact on the society. It has disempowered the country as a result of discrimination and demands immediate attention because it has adverse economic consequences. Farmers are vital to the Nation's well being. It is a prime responsibility of the entire society to be aware of this rising crisis among the framers, especially today's youth. Moreover, 2015 was declared as 'drought year' in Telangana. So the Institution decided to support the farmers by planning a fund raising even involving students and staff to raise awareness about the plight of the farmers.

The Institution also identified the need to support animal conservation authorities by contributing funds to adopt animals according to their requirement. Given their blithe spirits and positive minds, the young students were encouraged to donate money in consultation with their parents to support the zoological park of Hyderabad by adopting some of the animals. The students' love and compassion for animals was nurtured as they took a step forward to donate voluntarily in adopting animals in the city's Nehru Zoological Park.

PRACTICE:

Framer Support:

- A staff meeting was conducted to inform the staff members about the objectives of the programme. Discussion was held between the Principal and the Staff members regarding the activities to be taken up for the above cause in a meeting. It was decided that the students will be asked to put up stalls in three categories i.e., Food, Games and Accessories with dual objective of raising funds for the needy farmers and to inculcate Entrepreneurship spirit among the students. Two senior staff members were given charge to coordinate the event. Staff coordinators called for a meeting with student council members and class representatives, where the students were informed about the plan and were given instructions to explain the initiative to the respective students of their class. Students were asked to take their parents consent for the same.

- A Good response was received from the students for the stalls in all the three categories. The students were informed that for each stall the profit earned from the stalls should be contributed towards the farmers cause. After receiving the final list of the student participation for stalls, another meeting was held between the staff coordinators, student council members and the class representatives to discuss and decide the date, time of the event with the principals approval. It was decided that 15th & 16th Dec, 2015 the event would be conducted.
- The event was executed as per the plan; the response from the student was overwhelming. Around 200 students were involved in putting the stalls in all the three categories of stalls.
- From each stall the profit generated was collected by the staff coordinators which amounted to around Rs. 20000/- and was handed over to the principal.
- The amount generated was handed over in the form of cheque on the occasion of Women's day celebration on 12th March to Mrs. Akula Lalitha, wife of a farmer who committed suicide in the Bhainsa mandal, Adilabad district in the presence of Mr. Sangam Borranna , District President, Rythu Aatmahatyala Committee. All the staff and students were invited in this programme.
- The Principal appreciated the Students and Staff for their participation and successful completion of the event for a noble cause.

Animal Adoption:

- A staff meeting was called by the Principal to inform the staff members about the initiative of extending support to the zoological park. It was decided that the college would adopt animals from the Nehru Zoological Park, Hyderabad with an objective of cultivating compassion by taking care of animals in captivity. And to achieve this it was suggested that all the staff and the students be encouraged to contributed money as per their ability. One department was given charge to take up the event, coordinate the related activities and collaborate with the zoo - park authorities.
- The IQAC discussed the plan with the Student Council, Class Representatives and all the students. They were given instructions to explain the objective of the activity to the respective students of their class, their parents or guardians and report the responses. After receiving the confirmation of Students and the Staff, the event was finalized.
- The student representatives collected the money from staff and students which was handed over to the in charge department.
- The Principal along with the Staff and Student representatives visited the Hyderabad Zoological Park and donated the funds collected to adopt two peacocks and one crocodile.

- A group of students were taken to the zoo who experienced happiness in their successful effort of adopting the above animals.

Evidence of Success:

- The students started recommending more strategies to raise funds for social causes and promised to render their complete support for such programmes in the future. They also took initiatives to help the stray animals in their locality and spread awareness about the voluntary organisations who work for these animals. This compassionate attitude shows that the students were sensitised towards the problems prevailing in the society.

Problem encountered and resources required:

- Providing space for the stalls was an obstacle.
- Students come from various backgrounds and have varied mindsets, motivating them towards a social cause was a challenge.

Note: The Institution is planning to adopt more animals in the future, for example, the Spotted Deer, which is the state animal of Telangana.

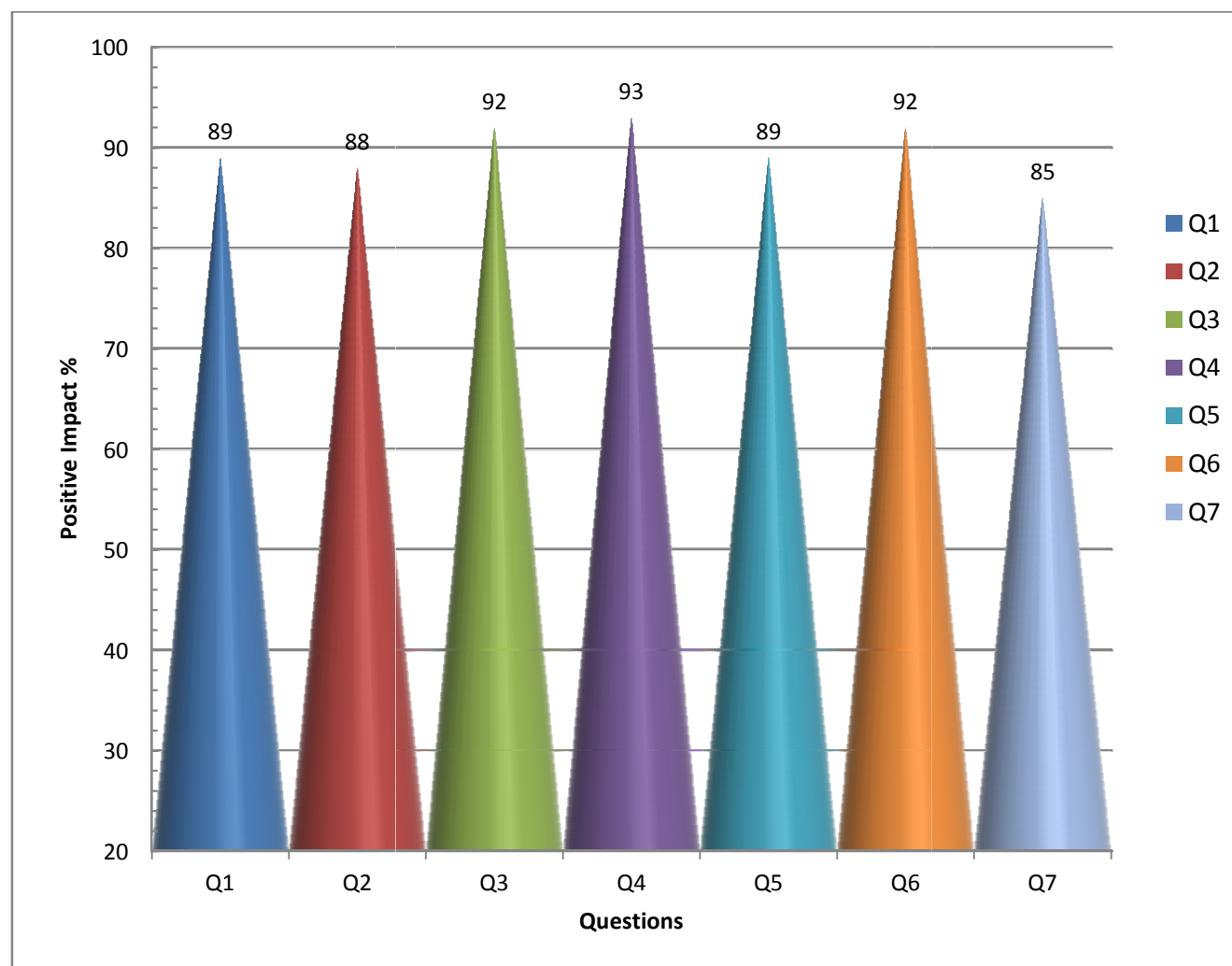
